6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

The College has an IQAC for the continuous assessment of teaching and learning process. The college IQAC comprises of the following members within the College, Principal as Chairman, One Coordinator, Five Committee members and twelve Department Representatives. The IQAC of the college conducts Meetings Once in a month in order to discuss and enhance the quality aspects relating to each and every aspect of the college with special reference to teaching learning process

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received and considerable measures are taken by the IQAC committee in collaboration with the heads of the departments to retrieve the same.

The IQAC has highlighted the importance of teaching and learning process by suggesting effective methods based on the principal courses sponsored by the American Association of Higher Education and Education Commission of the States and are intended as guidelines to faculty in order to improve their teaching and learning process.

- ➤ The Methods which encourage active learning in the class room such as discussion, practice session, structured exercises, Team Projects and research projects
- > To create a Conducive atmosphere and also to create a informal interaction between the teacher and students which is an important factor for motivation and involvement

Understanding each students unique strength and impart practical experience according to individual's strength and weakness.

- Feedback is obtained from students about difficulties on courses offered, courses desired and on modifications of curriculum if any.
- > Students make an appraisal of teacher support on a 17 point questionnaire. Scores are averaged to a five-point scale and teachers are given a feedback on all the 10 expectations of students from any teacher.
- > Students feedback are also used as a yardstick for the assessment of the performance of the faculty.
- ➤ Former students participate in academic decision-making. Each Board of Studies has an alumnus to offer counsel about syllabus revision in the context of contemporary
- Special Lectures are conducted for which corporate heads, experts, alumnae are invited; who share their experiences, try to impart knowledge and shape up the attitude required and expected from the students in the dynamic corporate world outside the institute. These events act as reality checks for students to realize their level of standing in particular areas in order to work upon handling challenges. This also gives an opportunity for receiving valuable suggestions on curriculum and teaching learning processes.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

6.3.4 Research and Development

The college encourages all the faculty members to update their knowledge and to upgrade the quality of learning by encouraging them to take up major and minor research projects for availing the funding support from various external agencies. Both staff and students are motivated to publish their research works in the reputed peer reviewed journals. The college proudly depicts the fact that the department of Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Computer Science, Economics, Tamil, English and Commerce are actively involved in scientific and community oriented research activities and receives funds from various agencies.

The Computer Science department has 60 computers with the processor Intel Core i3 and Intel Core i5. The Mathematics department has 35 computers with the processor Intel Core i3. Our Library has 10 Computers with Pentium Intel Dual Core. The MBA department has 10 computers with the processor Intel Celeron and 4 computers with the processor Intel core i3. The Economics department also has 4 Computers with the processor Intel Core i3. All other department has one or two computers depending upon their needs. The Computer Literacy Program Lab has 25 Computer with Intel Core i3. The English Language Lab has 15 Computer with Intel Core i3.

The LAN facility is available in Computer Science department, Library, Principal office and Controller of Examinations office with 2Mbps Speed.

Information regarding Major Research Projects / Minor Research Projects / FDP scheme was provided through the Staff academy. A centralized process of identifying funding agencies and motivating faculty members to apply for research projects to various

funding agencies was initiated. The committee looked after submission of applications to various agencies and then monitored the progress. Also, efforts were made to streamline the working of the unaided programmes based on the feedback received from the staff and students.
